Howie DOES IT

In near perpetual motion, Howie Mandel comes to a stop – briefly – for Boca Raton's Concours d'Elegance.

If he didn't have so much going on, Howie Mandel would be getting into trouble, pulling pranks on unsuspecting victims just like he did in high school. Wait a minute...that's exactly what he does in *Howie Do It*.

"Everything I've ever been punished or expelled for, NBC is paying me for," he says of the hidden-camera prank reality show that premiered Jan. 9.

It's just the latest project for Mandel, who has reinvented himself many times over since he first gained attention in the late '70s with his frenetic stand-up act. He played Dr. Wayne Fiscus in TV's St. Elsewhere in the '80s, created and voiced the animated series Bobby's World in the '90s and in recent years, he has hosted the game show Deal or No Deal. He still does as many as 200 gigs a year, including the Boca Raton Concours d'Elegance on Feb. 22.

C&S: What makes you laugh?

Howie: Real situations, more than jokes. If I hear a joke about two guys and a duck walking into a bar, it doesn't make me laugh as much as a real predicament with a real person dealing with it.

C&S: What are some of the predicaments in *Howie Do It*?

Howie: We have people auditioning to be weather-tainers...reading cue cards with a fire hose blasting in their face. We also have a guy doing singing telegrams as the Funny Bunny...but we send him to a funeral. These shows are fun to do...it feels like a bunch of kids being mischievous. And I get to work with my son, Alex, who is 19.

C&S: Alex is joining the family business?

Howie: Like a law firm, Howie & Son. He wanted to be in *Bobby's World*, but I wanted him to wait. As a child you have so little time without responsibility. I told him if he was still interested [in show business] when he turned 18, he could do it. He's in college, majoring in theater. My daughter Jackie is 24, an inner-city teacher, finishing up her master's in urban education. My youngest [16-year-old Riley] is into science and chemistry.

C&S: When you got your Hollywood Walk of Fame star last year, Jay Leno described you as a family man.

Howie: First and foremost. Terry and I have been together for 34 years, 29 years married. I'm just a lucky guy who chose the right person. It's a wonderful thing.

C&S: Is your wife funny?

Howie: I imagine she would
have to be. Most of my early life
I was surrounded by people who
didn't understand my humor. I was
asked to leave school. My wife
stayed with me and shared my
sensibilities. I run everything by
her. She is a great partner.

C&S: How do you keep your comedy fresh?

Howie: I hope to be taken off the path, to play off something that happens in the audience. I think of it as a giant party, and I'm the center of attention.

C&S: Concours d'Elegance includes a car and motorcycle exhibition. Are you into cars?

Howie: Right now I'm in a Smart Car. I'm going to put a hitch on it and pull another Smart Car behind me so I can carpool.
